

THE DISCIPLES OF THE MASTER KUNG-FU-TZE

1. Ch'en K'ang
2. Ch'i'tiao K'ai: a modest man.
3. Ch'in Chang
4. Chung Yu: a brave soldier whom the Master educated.
5. Chu Yuan: a former government officer.
6. Fan Hsu: a young soldier.
7. Fu-Pu- Ch'i
8. Jan Ch'iu: he gave way to greed and military power, earning the disapproval of the Master.
9. Jan Keng: through the Master's influence, he came to govern a town.
10. Jan Yung: noted for his fine character.
11. Ju Pei: he offended the Master so much that he was never received by him again.
12. Kao Ch'ai: Although small and ugly, he was of great worth and ability and came to be appointed the governor of a town through the influence of Chung Yu.
13. Kung-hsi Ch'ih: known for his extensive knowledge of the traditional rites.
14. Kung-yeh Ch' ang: wrongfully imprisoned early in his life, the Master gave him his daughter to wed.
15. Kung-po Liao: he slandered Chung Yu.
16. K'ung Li: the son of the Master.
17. Lin Fang
18. Min Sun: known for his purity.
19. Nan-kung Kua: the Master gave him his niece for a bride. He rescued the library of the Duke Ai from fire, and thus saved the Annals of the Chou Dynasty and other important works.
20. Pu Shang: he lived a very long life.
21. Shen Ch'eng: passionate and strong.
22. Ssu-ma K'eng: brother of a government official who attempted to have the Master assassinated.
23. Tan-t'ai Mieh-ming: at first the Master was repelled by his extreme ugliness, but in time he had 300 disciples of his own.
24. Tsai Yu: the Master was ashamed of the part he took in an uprising.
25. Tseng Shen: one of the most famous disciples, he was noble, dignified, solid in virtue, and pleasing in his appearance. He composed the Classic of Filial Piety, as well as (probably) ten books of the Book of Rites.
26. Tsen Tien: a lover of peaceful joys.
27. Tuan-mu Tzu: he rose from poverty to affluence through his own abilities, and mourned six years at the Master's grave instead of the three years mourned by the other disciples.

28. Tuan-sun Shih: humble and diligent.
29. Tzu-fu Ching-po: a government officer.
30. Wu-ma Shih
31. Yen Hui: a famous disciple, he had white hair at 29 because of his studying. He died before the Master, who mourned him passionately.
32. Yen Wu Yao: he came from a poor family.
33. Yen Yen: he reformed his people through education, and was highly commended by the Master.
34. Yu Jo: his good memory, love of antiquity, and kind personality made him extremely well-loved and famous.
35. Yuan Hsien: noted for his purity of purpose, modesty, and happiness even in poverty.
